Dear Consumer:

As you may know, Cutchins Program for Children and Families is also a public water system (PWS) responsible for providing drinking water that meets state and federal standards. This notice reports the lead and copper results from the samples collected at this facility on 10/31/2025.

☒ A total of five (5) were taken and the following table provides information on the tap location and the water sample result represented in parts per million (ppm):

☒ A total of five (5) samples were taken, and compliance is based on the 90th percentile for all of these samples. The 90th percentile lead and copper levels in your water system are as follows:

LEAD: 0.00205 milligrams per liter (mg/l). This result is ☐ above/ ☒ below the Lead Action Level of 0.015 mg/l.

COPPER: 0.6 milligrams per liter (mg/l). This result is ☐ above/ ☒ below the Copper Action Level of 1.3 mg/l.

What Does This Mean?

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) set the **Lead Action Level¹ for lead in drinking water at 0.015 ppm (or milligrams per liter (mg/l)) and the Copper Action Level at 1.3 ppm (or milligrams per liter (mg/l)).** Because lead may pose serious health risks, the EPA and MassDEP also set a **Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)² for lead of zero. The MCLG for copper is 1.3 mg/l.**

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Our public water system is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. We recommend the following tips to keep any potential lead and copper out of the water you drink:

-) Most importantly – Flushing your water is the simplest way to reduce exposure to lead. When your water has been sitting for several hours, flush the tap until the water feels cold before use.
-) Use only cold, fresh water for drinking, cooking, and preparing baby formula. Run the water for at least 1 minute or until after it turns cold.
-) Do not boil the water to remove lead or copper.

¹ The Action Level is the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

² The Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
